eMADANI programme is a one-off RM100 e-wallet credit



Announced by Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim during the previous budget tabling.



10 million eligible adults aged 21 and above (from B40 and M40) will receive the funds on their selected e-wallet upon successful application.
